## **STAMP OF THE MONTH**

TAIWAN — The Chinese stamp market is in large part driven by investors. Chinese collectors buy stamps in much the same way that American's invest in mutual funds. There is a lot of money being made in China right now, and a not-insignificant portion of it is going into the stamp market.

The market for People's Republic of China stamps has been hot and volatile for as long as most people can remember. Some of that has begun to spill over into the market for Taiwanese (Republic of China) stamps.

The 1954 set of four stamps commemorating the first anniversary of the opening of the Silo Highway Bridge (Scott 1092-95) is high and the prices are rising.

The Scott Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue values the mint set without gum as issued at \$317.50. The set is currently selling at retail for \$400 and is a good buy at that price.

Centering was a real problem with this issue, and true VF centering is difficult to find, but is not that critical to the value. Avoid missing or blind perforations, and buy the best centered set that you can find.

#### AT WAR WITH BRITAIN — AGAIN

JUNE 18, 1812

PRESIDENT James Madison signs a declaration of war against Great Britain and begins the War of 1812. In the request sent to Congress on June 1, Madison referenced the American belief that the British were inciting American Indians on the northwestern frontier and were behind the unrest associated with Tecumseh's pan-Indian movement in the Ohio Valley. He also cited grievances over British violations of American neutral shipping rights along with the British policy of boarding American merchant marine vessels and impressing into its navy both AWOL British sailors and American citizens alike.
