STAMP OF THE MONTH

MALI — On February 15, 1965, the African nation of Mali issued a beautifully engraved set of four Bird airmail stamps (Scott C25-28), done in the classic French colonies style of the 1950s and 1960s.

This is one of the most beautiful Bird topical sets of the time. Birds shown on the stamps in the set are touracos, Abyssinian ground hornbills, Egyptian vultures and Goliath herons. This set is popular with both French colonies collectors and bird topical collectors.

The Scott *Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue* values a mint set at \$43.25. You can probably find this set in the \$25-to-\$35 range, and it is a great buy at that price.

THE ONE-CENT Z GRILL

MERICA'S RAREST STAMP — with only two known, the 1¢ Z Grill of 1867 is America's rarest stamp and is valued in the millions. Benjamin Miller

donated his 1¢ Z Grill to the New York Public Library in 1925, where it remains in storage to prevent theft. Mystic acquired the only available 1¢ Z Grill in 1998 and proudly displayed it at several important philatelic shows, including World Stamp Expo 2000.



After the start of the Civil War in 1961, Postmaster General Montgomery Blair didn't want U.S. stamps paying the postage for mail sent from the Confederate states. He ordered a new stamp series with fresh designs. All stamps then in print were demonetized, meaning they were no longer valid for postage.

The die proof on India paper was submitted by National Bank Note Company, printer of the new series. It showed the design adopted for the 1¢ Franklin stamp, which was used for the 1¢ Z Grill of 1867.

At about the same time, the Post Office became concerned with stamp reuse, and begins testing ideas to prevent it. One enterprising inventor who worked to solve the problem was Charles F. Steel, the inventor of the grilling process.

ANCIENT LETTERS

Many collectors appreciate "old letters" but few have had correspondence discovered in the archeological excavations at Tel Aphek, inside the Egyptian governor's residence. The oldest letter is from Ugarit, about 1230 BC, and is written in Akkadian, a cuneiform script, impressed on a clay tablet. The letter was sent by the governor of Ugarit, a city in northern Syria, to the Egyptian governor of Canaan. He complained that what he had sent to a representative of the governor of Canaan was not returned to him as promised. The walls surrounding the Ottoman period fortress that once covered the Egyptian governor's residence appear beside the letter on the stamp.

The Lachish Letters date from 589 BC. This letter is written in ancient Hebrew, inked on a pottery shard. It was discovered in the archeological excavations at the Tel Lachish gate fortifications.

The Bar Kochva Letters are more "modern," from 134CE. This letter is written in Aramaic-Jewish script, inked onto papyrus. It was discovered in the Wadi Murabaat caves in the Judean Desert. The letter was sent by Shimon Bar Koziba, known as Bar Kochva, to Joshua Ben Galgula, one of his subordinates, advising military orders and threatening punishment if disobeyed. The Judean Desert landscape is depicted alongside the letter on the stamp.

These three ancient items were pictured on recent Israeli stamps.
