THERE are not too many months of the year that could inspire a quiz like the following one. May, however, works very nicely for a game involving geography and stamp-related and postal-related words that contain the letters M, A, and Y.

Those three letters are "free", and they are supplied as part of the answer to each of the 10 questions. You must complete the remaining letters in each answer.

- 1. The island between Madagascar and Africa historically has been associated with France, as a colony, a dependency and, in modern time, as an overseas department. May _ _ _ _
- 2. This inscription (two words) was added to U.S. stamp margins and booklets beginning in 1965, to encourage postal patrons to beat the daily rush.

3. Maybe not too commonly used, this hobby term refers to the specialty of collecting postmarks.

- This non-postal "stamp" is required for hunting certain waterfowl, with proceeds helping conservation projects. M _ _ _ a _ _ _ y Bird

LIST OF DON'TS

Don't paste stamps flat in album.

Don't use glue or paste for affixing stamps in album.

Don't use ordinary gummed paper or gummed parts of envelopes for hinges.

Don't remove a wet hinge from a stamp. Wait until it is perfectly dry.

Don't use too much moisture in hinging stamps. The overflow may cause the stamp to stick flat on its back.

Don't remove rare stamps from envelopes or other wrappers. These may be worth much more on a cover. Furthermore, removals of rare stamps from covers should be handled only by a skilled collector.

Do not remove plate numbers, or plate names, etc. from blocks of four. These usually add to the value.

Don't remove gum from unused stamps.

Don't handle stamps with unclean hands. The use of stamp tongs will avoid this.

Avoid smudges, creases and tears. These greatly depreciate the value of stamps.

Avoid thin spots by using on peel able hinges. Another way to safeguard against this, especially with more expensive stamps, is to use transparent (hinge less) mounts.

Don't expose stamps to the sunlight by display for any sustained period. This may discolor stamps or remove colors entirely.

Don't let water or other fluids contact chalky or other surface-coated paper, or stamps that have soluble printing inks. This may result in the removal of the design of the ink.

Don't accept stamps of questionable origin or encourage their circulation. This includes such material as counterfeits, forgeries, bogus stamps, facsimiles (so called album weeds) or other material sold with intent to deceive. The better element of philately is always fighting to keep the hobby clean. If these efforts are relaxed the hobby will eventually be flooded with all kinds of worthless labels as well as imitations.

Don't keep your album or any kind of unused stamps near a damp, humid place or expose to excessive heat. This may cause them to stick together or adhere to other matter. Use glassine interleaving between stamps where possible.
